MISSION & VALUES

VALUES

The Teresa Group values and respects the Ontario Human Rights Codes (1981) that prevent discrimination on the basis of race, ancestry, place of origin, colour, ethnic origin, citizenship, creed, sex, sexual orientation, age, marital status, family status or disability; we express this by acknowledging and informing ourselves of the history of discrimination (at individual and institutional levels) and its harmful effects – in all forms – on individuals and communities and by becoming sensitized to and addressing the ways individual and organizational behaviours or actions may be experienced or interpreted as discriminatory by individuals we work with and serve, individuals within our organization, and individuals representing other agencies/organizations/communities.

The Teresa Group values and respects one another in our various capacities as volunteers, staff and board members, for who we are as individuals, and for what we contribute personally and collectively to the work of The Teresa Group; we show this by the quality of our interpersonal relationships, cooperation in a common endeavour, and concern for the emotional, physical, social and spiritual well-being of one another.

The Teresa Group values and respects the work of other agencies, groups and individuals in their advocacy and support for families living with HIV and AIDS and where possible we express this through cooperation and collaboration.

The Teresa Group values and respects the public and private material contributions we receive and we express this by our careful stewardship of those resources, employment practices that balance the needs and interests of employees and funders, the careful and responsible design, administration, and delivery of programs and services and the distribution of those resources to families in a manner that is non-discriminatory and balances between fairness and equality to all families and to the special needs of individual families or family members.







STRATEGIC OBJECTIVES

The Teresa Group's Strategic Plan 2011-2015 outlined six strategic objectives. Below we offer highlights in each of these six areas.

HIGHLIGHTS

The vear 2015 marks the celebration of The Teresa Group's 25 years of service to children and families affected by HIV!

This year we served 525 children in 286 families in the **GTA** and across the province of Ontario.

85 volunteers **donated 10,132** hours of service the equivalent of 5.5 full-time staff over the year.

EXEMPLARY CHILD AND FAMILY-FOCUSED PROGRAMS

The Teresa Group continues to be just one of a handful or organisations in North America focused on children and families affected by HIV and AIDS. We continue to deliver innovative, high quality programs and services that are evaluated and adapted to meet client needs. Our goal is to offer continuity of care and support at every stage of a child's development, ranging from pre-natal support through to the stage where children successfully transition into adult care. A broad range of services and programs is in place including practical supports, counselling and support groups.

Moorelands came on board in 2014 as our Summer Camp partner. They provided us with a beautiful venue near Dorset, Ontario - a perfect place for children to experience summer camp. Not only did they provide us with the site and delicious food but their staff also led various programs. This is an exciting collaboration and the 2015 camp will again be held at the Moorelands site, much to the excitement of the children.

Program highlights also include the increased engagement of our community and energy in the New Moms group and the Parenting Club and the co-production (with CATIE) of a booklet entitled "Is Formula Good for My Baby?"

In October 2014, retired former Executive Director, Karen Vance-Wallace, was recognized for her service and commitment to the community with the Ontario AIDS Network's Caring Hands Award. Congratulations Karen!

RESULTS & IMPACT

GOVERNANCE

An exciting development is our move towards accreditation through the Imagine Canada Standards process, ongoing into 2015. Thanks to the Ontario Organisational Development Program (OODP) the Board benefitted from an excellent governance workshop in October 2015 - helping us identify progress as well as gaps. Board committees that were set up in 2013, really flourished and developed this past year. The committee structure helps to focus board members' skills and expertise.

DONOR-CENTERED

Our increasing focus on recognizing donors and enhanced stewardship of donors, as well as identifying potential supporters bore fruit as we saw an increase in our funding from Foundations. Our annual gala event, the Chrissie Cameron-Boshart Memorial Dinner and Toy Auction raised an amazing \$20,000 for the summer camp program and has raised almost \$2 million overall over the past 14 years.

STRENGTHEN AND ENHANCE OUR COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS

The Teresa Group is engaged in a number of strategic partnerships that enhance our work. Since our inception we have worked in a close relationship with SickKids Hospital in Toronto. The Teresa Group social workers, supported by SickKids staff, run hospital-based psycho-educational support groups with children and youth on clinic days - a unique aspect of this relationship.

Circle of Care is a consortium of five AIDS service organisations in Toronto focused on care and support for women living with HIV. The Teresa Group provides programs for new moms, home and hospital visits as well as early years counselling for moms with children aged 0-6 years.

A highlight this year was the emergence of the OASPY network - Ontario Agencies Serving Positive Youth. Spearheaded by the AIDS Committee of Durham Region, The Teresa Group and SickKids Hospital, this new network aims to promote the health and dignity of and social connections among youth living with HIV.

Our involvement in research partnerships has expanded and is a reflection of the growing recognition of The Teresa Group's expertise and experience in issues related to children and families affected by HIV and AIDS and the value of our contribution both in research and practice.

FOSTER A QUALITY WORK ENVIRONMENT

The Human Resources Committee of the Board led an agency-wide review of salaries which resulted in the development of new salary scales for each position. A focus on training and development led us to conduct an Anti-Racism Anti-Oppression workshop and a Vicarious Trauma workshop for staff, a Board governance workshop and the completion of the first year of a 3-year project to implement an agencywide GIPA/MIPA plan for the greater and meaningful involvement of people living with HIV.

KNOWLEDGE EXCHANGE

The highlight of our knowledge exchange activities was the international symposium held in Melbourne, Australia, in July 2014. Held in conjunction with the international AIDS conference, the symposium gathered global leaders, researchers and frontline service providers together for an exciting and inspiring 2-day event. For more information about the symposium, please visit the Coalition for Children Affected by AIDS website www.ccaba.org The Teresa Group staff also participated in Opening Doors conferences in several regions. Our research partnerships also included a number of KTE workshops in various regions. We continue to experience an increased demand for presentations about our work.

OPPORTUNITIES AND CHALLENGES

One very exciting opportunity is that, due to the incredible advances in treatment for HIV, there is now a critical group of youth born with HIV who are now in their 20s. These long time survivors bring energy, commitment and a unique view of life with HIV for 20+ years. Our youth initiatives include Leading the Way groups and the Summer Camp Counsellor-in-Training program and show great potential for growth and for developing the potential of these extraordinary young people.

There is growing recognition in our field of impact of HIV on children. This is seen through the increase in requests from other organisations, both in the AIDS service field and beyond, for presentations and/or educational workshops about issues specific to children. Without dedicated outreach/education staff, it is sometimes difficult to accommodate all these requests. We have a really exciting few years ahead! With the development of a new strategic plan in 2015, we will focus on enhancing our core skills and seize new opportunities to better serve children and families affected by HIV and AIDS.

The Teresa Group offers a broad range of programs to children and families throughout the life cycle.

PRE-NATAL PROGRAM

The Pre-Natal Group was offered to women living with HIV to help prepare them for birth, delivery and the post-partum period. The group is visited by a multi-disciplinary team of professionals and the participants learned about and discussed issues related to medication, privacy, disclosure and testing for the baby. The group also gave expectant moms an opportunity to connect with others in a safe and caring environment. The group allowed women a safe space and dedicated time with knowledgeable professionals to ask questions about childbirth specific to women living with HIV. Ongoing individual support is also offered through our counselling services to help women prepare for delivery, post-partum infant care and formula feeding and all moms are presented with a diaper bag filled with newborn supplies.

LEADING THE WAY THERAPEUTIC GROUPS FOR CHILDREN

CHILDREN IN EACH SESSION

This activity-based psychosocial program for children aged 6-18 runs twice a year for nine weeks in the spring and in the fall. It aims to enhance their sense of self and their ability to cope and problem solve. "Leading the Way" is an award-winning intervention that was developed as a response to research showing that children affected by HIV and AIDS were far more likely to experience anxiety and depression.

NEW MOMS GROUP

Twice a month, moms with babies up to a year old met together in a facilitated support group. Each meeting focused on different aspects of life with a new baby - e.g. adjusting to life with HIV, baby massage, HIV stigma, why babies cry and how to cope, attachment and bonding, discovering your personal values and how they impact on parenting, how culture and parenting connect. The activities were designed to engage. teach and stimulate as new moms get to know one another in their first year. The group also brings new moms living with HIV together in a safe space to form friendships and support networks. This year we collaborated with CATIE to develop a booklet entitled "Is Formula Good for my Baby?" to address the many questions new or expectant moms ask about infant formula feeding and the complex emotions surrounding this. The booklet is available in English and French. We also developed a breast care leaflet as a resource for new moms.

PROGRAMS

10 MOMS & TODDLERS

TODDLER GROUP

After the children turn a year old. moms and toddlers join this group of busy little walkers. The meetings this year focused on popular topics such as toilet training, nutrition and eating habits, communication and behavior, teeth and dental care. With more children being in davcare while parents return to work or school, the challenge for this group was to find a convenient time to meet. To respond to this challenge we introduced flexibility to allow moms to attend the group without their toddlers if the child was in daycare and this allowed the parents to still connect with others and get useful tips and advice about parenting a toddler.

PARENT CLUB 21
PARENTS

This monthly group offers a place for parents of children of all ages to meet together and share the jovs and trials of parenting, learn about stages of child development and age appropriate behavior management (always a popular topic). The Parent Club grew this year as we saw the importance of peer support networks developing amongst the parents. The most popular themes included: understanding the impact of positive and negative emotions and how to re-frame everyday interactions with positivity; behavior management in the context of stages of child development and how children communicate through behavior: sharing experiences of HIV-related stigma and the management of associated feelings and how to support children in such contexts.

COUNSELLING AND CASE MANAGEMENT SERVICES

213 NEW INTAKES 1,240 ONGOING INDIVIDUALS

Individual, couple and family counselling is offered to support children and families. An in-depth intake process assesses the needs of the family and is the first step towards providing practical and emotional supports and referrals. Issues include poverty, immigration/refugee experiences and processes, cultural issues settling in Canada – including children in the school system, parenting and behavior management, trauma, violence and its impact on the family. HIV stigma and disclosure.

20 CHILDREN

GROUP AT SICKKIDS HOSPITAL

These psycho-educational groups help children at different ages come to terms with and understand an HIV diagnosis, help them form peer support and assist with issues related to transitioning to adult care as they reach the age of 18.

LEAP FOR SUCCESS TUTOR/MENTOR PROGRAM

This program provides students in Grades 2-12 with individual tutoring for an hour a week through the school year (October to June). Children are matched with a skilled and dedicated volunteer tutor/mentor for the year. Children continue to show success and positive development through this program - it is sometimes amazing to see what just an hour a week of individual attention with a skilled, caring, patient tutor can achieve!

SUMMER CAMP

For one week in the summer, forty children aged 9-18 attend a residential summer camp near Dorset, Ontario. Run in partnership with Moorelands, the program aims to help children and youth build life skills that will help them to live self-sufficient, independent and productive lives as well as develop important social support networks and, most importantly to have fun! Activities include swimming, canoeing, archery, high and low ropes courses, sports, arts and crafts and wilderness hiking.

PROGRAMS

INFANT FORMULA PROGRAM

This program helps reduce transmission of HIV through breastmilk. Funded by the Ontario Ministry of Health and Long Term Care through the AIDS Bureau, The Teresa Group administers the distribution of infant formula to babies born to HIV+ moms throughout Ontario. This year, through a collaboration with CATIE, a booklet called "Is Formula Good for my Baby?" Developed for expectant and new moms it helps answer some of the most frequently asked questions and concerns about formula feeding.



CIRCLE OF CARE

The Circle of Care Initiative is a collaborative approach to providing diverse, innovative and practical support services for women living with HIV or AIDS in Toronto. The Circle of Care Initiative was designed in response to women's own stated needs and interests. Its goals are to stabilize, strengthen and expand programs for women affected by HIV and AIDS. Circle of Care is a consortium of five AIDS Service Organisations: AIDS Committee of Toronto (ACT), Black Coalition for AIDS Prevention (Black CAP), Prisoners with HIV/AIDS Support Action Network (PASAN), Toronto People with AIDS Foundation (PWA) and The Teresa Group.

FAMILY SUPPORT PROGRAM

This program provides a broad range of practical supports to most of our children and families to help alleviate the impact of poverty. The program includes the provision of grocery vouchers, emergency food supplies, transit tokens, diapers for children aged 0-3 years, clothing (both new and used) and emergency financial support. Other aspects of this program include warm hats and mitts for children when the weather gets cold, new backpacks filled with supplies at the start of each school year.

RESEARCH AND KNOWLEDGE EXCHANGE

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on the summary financial statement based on our procedures, which were conducted in accordance with Canadian Auditing Standards (CAS) 810, "Engagements to Report on Summary Financial Statements".

Opinion


In our opinion, the summary financial statement derived from the audited financial statements of The Teresa Group Child and Family Aid for the year ended March 31, 2015 is a fair summary of those financial statements. However, the summary financial statement is qualified to the equivalent extent as the audited financial statements of the Teresa Group for the year ended March 31, 2015.

The qualification of the audited financial statements is described in our qualified audit opinion in our report dated May 21, 2015. Our qualified audit opinion is based on the fact that the Teresa Group receives donations, the completeness of which is not susceptible to satisfactory audit verification. Accordingly, our verification of these revenues was limited to the amount reported by the Teresa Group and we were not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to revenues, excess of revenues over expenses, assets and net assets. Our qualified audit opinion states that, except for the effects of the described matter, those financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of The Teresa Group Child and Family Aid as at March 31, 2015 and its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not for profit organizations.
